By using the library within the guidelines from the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, we are able to safely stay open during the pandemic. So, thank you!

The pandemic has disrupted our lives in many ways. But with disruptions come opportunities, and the library has been adjusting and stretching resources in light of the challenges of 2020. Here is what to look for:

In March we are adopting the SirsiDynex catalog system through the Valley Library Consortium which will connect us to 27 partner libraries and their collections. You will notice a wider selection of books, more copies of popular books, and a faster turnaround for books not on our shelves. With this change comes new library card numbers and a new barcode system.

Many of you experienced a crash course in downloading an ebook or audiobook during the lock-down. The library was and is still happy to help assist you in getting started with ebooks and audio downloads. With the merging of Overdrive and RB Digital, we are happy to report that your one stop for all digital content will be in your Overdrive/Libby app.

As always, your safety is very important to us. Our Pandemic Response Plan as well as our Patron PPE policy are posted on our website and available at the library. Thank you for doing your part so we can continue to be open to the public. Your response to changes we have made and your continuing support make for a great community partnership.






Check Out New Cutting Edge Resources

Pandemic or not, the library continues to support families. One way is through enhancements we've made to our



Sensory Backpack Kits on the topics of Autism, Down Syndrome, How to Be a Better Me, How to Be a Better Friend, and Dyslexia were also added through a grant from the University of Michigan School of Information. These kits are useful tools for all, regardless of a diagnosis or abilities. You might want to try one of our new VOX books, a book with an audio recording built right in. Research shows pairing visual and auditory senses helps fluidity in reading and increases vocabulary. These books are flying off the shelves, so we continue to add new titles.

Finally, our **Playaway Launchpads** are the first-ever secure learning tablets created just for children. Each Launchpad is pre-loaded with high quality, ad-free learning apps grouped by age, grade level, subject area and theme. These tablets are easy to use, do not need WiFi or downloading, come in robust cases, and like all of our new resources, can be checked out for three weeks at a time.

Tweens and teens can connect with the library through our monthly activities. Every two weeks, pick up a **Take and Make** kit in the lobby. Families, go on an adventure by joining our Goosechase Scavenger Hunts, released once a month. You could win some great local gift cards!




We Look to the Future




We adapt: Judge Chris Nuechterlein's Constitution Series changed to a Zoom format without missing a step.
